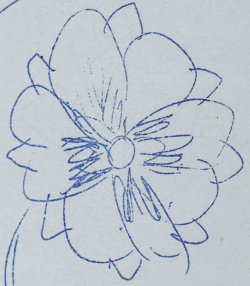
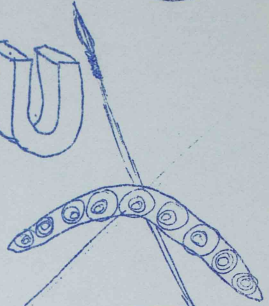
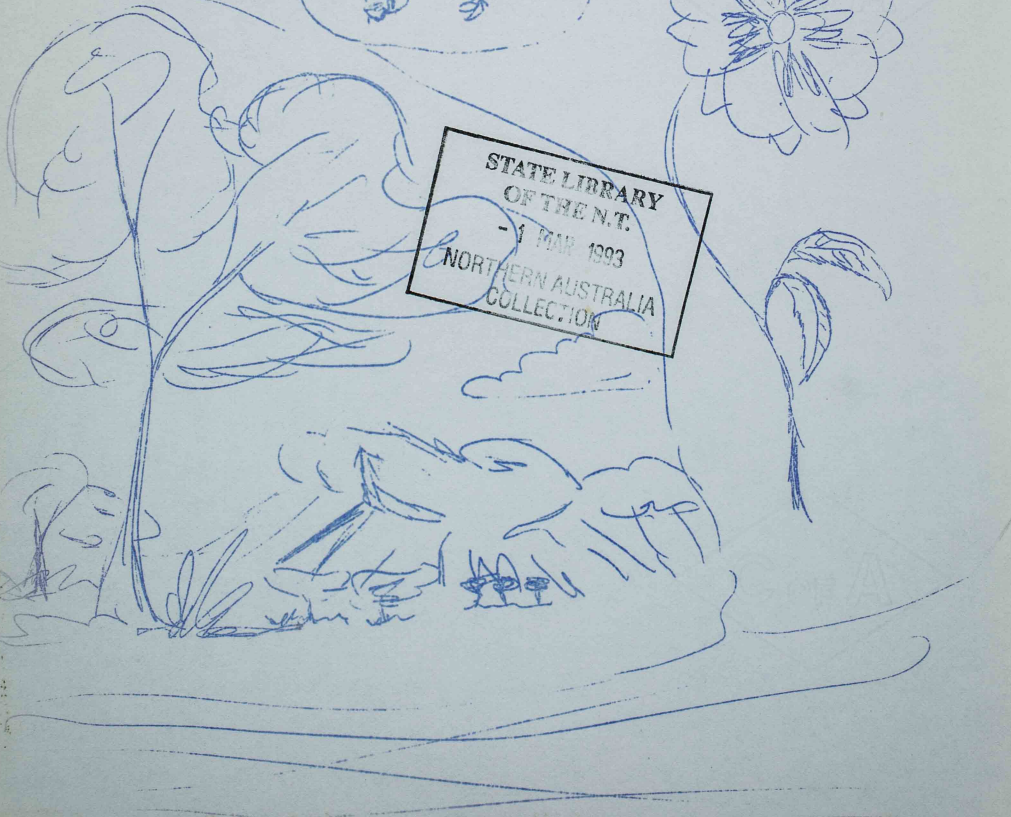

The reserve is on top of a hill. There is one creek but very few trees. It is very open and dusty. They are Pitjantjatjara people.
