Term One - 2018

Welcome to the end of another busy term at Yirara College.

This term, we welcomed 12 male students to Yirara to participate in the MotoScouts program. This program is delivered off campus for 16 weeks, with the students doing a combination of theory and manual work.

The MotoScouts program is a Scouts NT initiative in conjunction with the Motor **Trades Association** (MTA) (NT) where participants will



gain valuable employability skills and training by being part of a team building a Motorkhana-style car.

Participants have the opportunity to gain a Certificate I in Automotive, undertake driver training (in the Motorkhana car that they help build), obtain a White Card, first aid, financial literacy and cross-cultural training as well as work experience.



Each week they gain valuable life skills (as well as having a lot of fun) through the Scouts recreation program. If you would like further information on this program, please contact the pathways office at the college.



The female students have now started on the Earthtec intensive program that was delivered to the male students last year. Yirara staff are working closely with Theiss to arrange support and mentoring for the ladies interested in this program.



All students are actively involved in the electives programs each afternoon and we thank the staff for the support, guidance and commitment in sharing this program. The students are learning a wide range of skills through this program that they can take home to share with their families.

Boarding continues to be a busy place. The sporting activities available for both male and female students is increasing, and we thank Mr. Tama and Mr. Mark for their support in this space. The ladies teams are doing well in their evening sport activities.

We look forward to welcoming Pastor Basil Schild as college pastor at the beginning of term three. 

**Flexible Learning Centre** was rewarded with a mid-term excursion due to everyone working well together.


The fellas love seeing the big croc but were keen to come inside for the lizard and snake show.

Building our **senior students skills** is very importiant, this term they have been learning to use a microscope and how to prepare their own slides.


Next term they will need these skills as they explore that other world, the really, really small place we don't always see.

As part of our intensive education program, the Central Australian Aboriginal Congress delivered the Deadly Choice program to all of our Year 7/8 girls. They explored a range of topics from chronic diseases and harmful substances, to healthy relationships and leadership and self esteem. To support the theory learning we took the girls on excursions to the Dialysis Unit, DASA, YMCA Rock Climbing where they

listened to stories of survival and healing from the women of the Tangentyere Women's Safety Program.



Five of our senior girls attendanced the International Women's Day breakfast which was held at the Double Tree Hilton. They listened to the guest speaker, Andrea Mason's inspirational story of strength, courage and hope. Our Year 7/8 Students attended the International Women's Day



The Girls Academy hosted a special breakfast for two Commonwealth Games Para Athletes-Torita Blake and Melissa Tapper. The Athletes did some early morning stretches and games with our girls before joining them for a healthy breakfast.



In week seven, as part of their Leadership activities, our Year 7/8 Students hosted the KITES students from Sadadeen Primary School. This term we saw a few staff changes with Charlie Lowson taking reigns as Director and Cyril Rioli returning to work along with Gibson Turner as our third member.



Two other exciting opportunities happening in Pathways are the Moto Scouts program and a cadetship with the NTPFS.



The Moto Scouts program is a 16 week program as part of the Scouts NT initiative in conjunction with the Moto Trades Association and Yirara College.



Well done to Tara who has been accepted into a two year cadet program with the NTPFS (NT police, fire and emergency services). Tara's career goal is to be a police officer to help and support people in communities.

This program includes a Certificate II in Community Engagement and a Certificate III in Business. This program also includes an outdoor adventure and leadership camp.

Visits to Indigenous communities to learn about cultural and community engagement and opportunities to do volunteer work. Also doing training with the fire and emergency services.

**Drive safe** has been delivering six lessons a week this Term for students who are on their learner license. Students are completing competencies to work towards their Provisional license.

Term two will also offer Theory one for students who are 16 and ready to get their learner license and start driving lessons.

The students will gain employability skills and training as well as team building a Motorkhana-style car.

#### Yirara College of the Finke River Mission

Yirara College was established initially in 1973 as a government secondary residential college for traditionally oriented Aboriginal students. Later in 1991 negotiations between Finke River Mission (FRM), the central Australian Aboriginal parent family client group, the Northern Territory Government and the Federal Government commenced with the aim of FRM assuming control of the college. FRM assumed control of the college in 1993.

Today Yirara College is a vibrant and busy community providing a wide range of teaching and recreational resources to its boarding students. via

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
