Our success is attributed to the significant contribution of everyone.



Greetings to all in the Yirara College community, from the College Board. In 2022, the Board continued to meet in person at Yirara and online. We have been delighted with the progress and performance of the College in challenging times, under the leadership of Principal Chris England, Deputy Principal Greg Miller, Director of Business Operations John Hubner, the Leadership Team and staff.

Late last year, the Strategic Plan and Operational Plans were initiated by Staff and the Leadership Team. The plans were approved during the year after the Board had the opportunity to make recommendations.

Similarly, the Organisational Structure of the Leadership Team was developed over the last 12 months and implemented during 2022.

The College was delighted to receive a Commonwealth Grant for Boarding during 2022 which we hope will be extended for second year in 2023

The mandatory Covid Plan established by the College in 2020 has been well managed for almost three years now. The regulations and mandates have been explained and communicated with sensitivity and care, for the protection of staff, visitors and communities. Unfortunately, staff shortages meant a reduction in student attendance. We thank the teaching staff and assistants for their dedicated and professional efforts in the face of challenging circumstances. The use of Yirara 2U and ICTV was professional and inspiring, promoting entertaining communication to communities and online learning. Thanks also for maintaining a positive work ethic and support for and loyalty to, the College leader.

Chaplain Basil has continued to deliver the chapel program, ministry to the Yirara community and engaging Faith experiences for students, visitors and staff, while challenged by difficulties arising from the Pandemic – at the same time he has been supporting the vacant Alice Springs Lutheran Congregation and conducting a number of funerals. He has also introduced regular Cultural Awareness professional development for all staff, focusing on 'Community Context'.

Students have continued to benefit from experiences organised by Girls' Academy, Clontarf, Pathways, Yirara TV, technical and creative programs. The Board is delighted to hear about the active student participation in training, work and Work Experience as well as solid improvements in Literacy. Construction of the Outdoor Education Area now provides an excellent teaching space on campus. The advice and guidance from the Indigenous Steering Committee is having a significant impact in the area of cultural training for staff. This is particularly important for new staff who need to be aware of the issues and challenges which boarding students bring to their experience at Yirara.

Yirara has made a substantial investment in Solar electricity generation and storage over the last two years. A review was conducted this year of Solar Panel use compared with using the Grid. The College is better off financially, and will be into the future.

Principal Chris undertook a positive Performance Review and we thank him for his calm, thoughtful and wise leadership.

Chris Pfeiffer did not re-nominate for the Board at the end of 2021 after 8 years of dedicated service. His knowledge of the operations of the College and relationships with Finke River Mission (FRM) have been missed this year and we acknowledge is faithful service.

As a part of FRM and the Lutheran Church Of Australia, Yirara's Community Liaison Officers (CLOs) have been increasing their engagement with the FRM Field Workers. Both groups play a vital role in visiting remote communities, building relationships, engaging with community leaders, parents, students and old scholars and enhancing the links between these communities and the support resources of the broader LCANZ. The Boards of Yirara and FRM are delighted to see this increasing collaboration.

The Kintore campus has been going well with Peter Musinskis taking over as the acting teacher in 2022. We thank Peter for his flexibility and competence in taking on this remote role.

Next year Yirara celebrates its 50th anniversary as a boarding school and preparations are underway for this momentous event.

It is with sadness and great appreciation that FRM and Yirara farewell their shared Chairman, Tim Stollznow, at the end of 2022 Tim grew up as the child of a FRM Field Worker in Papunya and has held a special place in his heart for the indigenous communities of central Australia throughout his life. He has devoted a great deal of his time and expertise, voluntarily, over the last decade, furthering the interests of the College, its students and the support provided to central Australian indigenous communities via Yirara and FRM. The Board members and the school community wish him well in his future endeavours and know that Yirara and FRM will continue to receive his support from afar in years to come. ## **Christian Studies**

In Christian Studies lessons students read the Bible and other stories, watch videos, prayed, discussed and reflected on God's love, which is for all people and how it can be an important part of their own lives.

- "Jesus, his life and teachings" was the theme for Term 1. The person and work of Jesus Christ is central to Christianity. The stories of Jesus' baptism and some of his miracles such as feeding a big crowd and healing the blind man were shared with students. At the end of Term, Easter stories were studied. Most of these stories were recorded for Yirara2u which was live streamed and shared on-line through ICTV, Yirara Facebook and YouTube platforms.
- In Term 2 students were back in the classroom for face-to-face lessons with the theme of "Worship the Lord." Pastor Basil talked to students about the symbols and colours used in different seasons of the church year. Students learned more about prayer, Baptism and Holy Communion.
- "What if...?" was the big question asked in Term 3 as students considered the work of Australian Lutheran World Service among some of the poorest communities in the world. Some of the questions were "What if I was born in a refugee camp?" and "What if my water makes me sick?" Students then created a poster about water, how they use it and thanking God for clean water.
- In Term 4 students learned more about Christian spirituality and explored Bible stories telling what Heaven and Hell will be like. And finally, they read stories of Angels as messengers in various parts of the Christmas story.









## Year 78A

2022 proved to be another exciting year for 78A. With lots of new students joining our class, it was amazing to see our students working and learning together. A couple of our highlights was we had the pleasure of meeting Ranger Jennie who guided us on an excursion outside of Simpsons Gap and Mr Heymor from Keep Australia Beautiful, who spoke to us about the importance of Recycling.

In Maths, we improved our counting and basic facts knowledge by using our number lines. This helped us with counting both forwards and backwards when solving addition and subtraction problems. With Measurement, we learnt how to use a ruler to measure different objects. This was fun as it taught us the importance of understanding length, distance and weight.

In Integrated Learning, we explored the different ways we can care for country. It was interesting to learn how we can recycle our rubbish to make things like furniture, cutlery and even clothes. We also learned how to plan and write creative stories. It was great to see the wide range of creative characters we came up with as a class.

We look forward to seeing everyone back in 2023!














## Middle School 78C

I was fortunate to step out of the Head of Teaching and Learning role this year to return to the classroom and spend time with an amazing group of students in terms two, three and four. During numeracy classes, we focused on basic number skills with regular addition and subtraction practice and daily skip counting. We examined measurement, data, time, simple fractions and money problems.

In Integrated learning, we explored what 'Caring for Country' means with a visit from the rangers and Keep Australia Beautiful. Everyone enjoyed writing their own fictional stories, which was a lot of fun, spent time creating our characters and looking at problems and solutions in fictional stories. In Term four we looked at 'Awesome Aussies' and how they have influenced others.

During Wellbeing classes, we looked at feelings and emotions and discussed ways to express them appropriately, that it's always better to tell someone how you are feeling and ask for help before things become too hard. We wrote about our feelings in our weekly online 'Class DoJo' journals.

Special thanks to the many LSO's (Lurtheran School Officers) who supported us this year, particularly Mr. Max and Mr. Daniel. Also, thanks to Mr. Mark who helped us all with our daily reading skills.



### Middle School 9A



The students of 9A have had a fantastic Year. Despite doing long-distance learning in Term one, students returned in Term two very eager to learn and get back into the swing of things.

Students had the opportunity to engage in exciting off-campus excursions throughout the year. Some of the main highlights were the opportunity to go to Simpson's Gap, the claypans, and a full-day trip to Gemtree Caravan Park. At Gemtree, they had a great time learning about garnets and even had an opportunity to fossick for their own.

Math classes participated in mental math and math game rotations. Students had the opportunity to work in pairs to hone their skills and have fun in the process.

We focused on addition, subtraction, and place value with some challenging math puzzles and games. The math topics included measurement and understanding the world of finance and budgeting.

In Integrated Learning, we expanded students' ability to express themselves both in words and on paper. 9A students were able to reflect on memories, stories, and their community to showcase their experiences through PowerPoint presentations, written stories, and oral recounts.



### Moving up to learning in Year 9 as seniors in the Middle School has been exciting.

Each term we learned more about making strong choices to get an education.

We discovered that many Indigenous peoples from other parts of the world don't have the same choices that we have about education and living on country.

We learned about the importance of managing our money, to keep a track of our spending in a budget and to keep learning about basic facts and multiplication tables.

We learned skills to build up our confidence to move out of our comfort zone, to speak up and conquer our fear of shame.

But....

The best thing in Year 9 is that we get to go on excursion every week.

We have walked the land at Desert Park, looked for art created by family at the Araluen Art Centre, made new friends and fossicked for precious gemstones.

We all agree that Year 9 is the best.

So here is our advice for fun and success.

The year 9C fellas' class was created mid-way through 2022 with the intention of providing a safe learning environment where fellas can be themselves, particularly when learning about more sensitive topics in health and PE. It also allowed students to have more one-on-one support in a smaller class with their teacher and LSO.

In the Academic space we focused on creative writing, by producing a story about our community. It was great to read some of the accounts about crocodile attacks and students exploring some of the things they love about growing up in the bush: building a shelter or hunting trips. In Maths, we focused on learning about Money, wages and budgeting – an important and necessary life skill.

A highlight of the term was getting to participate in year nine weekly excursions off campus to see places around town like the desert park, art centres, Simpsons Gap and more. Getting a hands-on learning experience, or just exposure to different places within the community is a good foundation for the senior years when students will get to go out for work experience.

Another highlight of term 3 was our all-day trip to Gem tree, where we got to learn about different gems and stones and try our luck in fossicking for garnets. It was great to see students work in teams and really get involved. Teams were mixed and prizes were given for the most finds and for the biggest garnet.

Wow, I can't believe that I have been at Yirara for 5 years already. It has been great seeing some of my Yr. 7/8 students of 2019/2020 returning to my class as young men and young women in Year 10. They have grown so much in the last few years.

It has also been great having Mr. Dave, who was previously in boarding, join our class as the Learning Support Officer (LSO). He really worked well with the students.

Every term the students participated in a week of work experience at various places in and around Alice Springs such as Salvos, Reptile Centre, the Toy Library and IGA to name a few. They were also enrolled in a range of VET courses such as Rural Ops, Retail, Agrifoods and Music with Charles Darwin University.

During the year we celebrated various important days such as NAIDOC Day and Reconciliation Day. For our NAIDOC Day celebrations we went out to Simpsons Gap where we took part in a variety of cultural games and listened to prominent community leaders. Throughout the year we learnt about different topics such as data handling, the importance of time and scheduling, writing our own short story and mining in the NT. Science was another fun topic we enjoyed. We learnt about space, and water, as a solid, liquid and gas (condensation). How to use dirty water to make clean water. How to make a makeshift home-made oven out of a pizza box.

It has been great working with the young people in my Year 10 class this past year and look forward to more opportunities for our young aspiring leaders.

### 10B





Senior School Class 10B have worked well all year. Their subjects included Integrated Learning (literacy based), Numeracy, Sharing Language classes, Science, Christian Studies, Health, Sport, Wellbeing, Duke of Ed and Music. What a mix!

Students enjoyed these classes with different teachers, in different places. In Integrated Learning we have been looking at narratives by other writers and thinking about storytelling: What makes a good story? A story can be fiction or made up or another approach is for students to tell a true story from their own life. These are usually the better ones! Well done. In Maths, the focus has been time. Students compared and read time using 24 hour, and 12 hour am/pm frameworks. Further, time as associated with Time Management, Reading Schedules, including class and local bus timetables. As Seniors they looked at Calendars, timetables and rosters with a work-related focus. This is an important year for them before work or going on to Years 11 or 12. ## Senior Class A

2022 started slowly for Senior Class A (SCA), with Term one taught online. Our Integrated Learning unit was on 'Drugs and Alcohol', there were certainly some exciting lessons taught, and they are available on Yirara's Facebook, YouTube channels and ICTVplay. Some students arrived at the College for a few weeks, and they added to the online lessons, as well as learning about the history and dangers of drugs and alcohol.

In Term two, the Integrated Learning (IL) had a focus on 'Car Ownership', and again this was very interesting as many of our students are getting their licenses to drive. It is good to think about the cost of owning and running a car. We also joined four other schools in the city to do an Election Activity and learn about the support agencies available. It is important to understand how to make our vote count. We also had Work Experience, Athletics Carnival, etc. In Term three, IL was about 'Business', and students have been learning what a business is, how they operate and that having your own business is an option in the future as there is a lot of support in society for Indigenous Business. We had guest speakers in talking about business, and we went to Standley Chasm as 'tourists' for a day to see how a successful Indigenous company operates and to be inspired by our own ideas.

They work towards credits for their Northern Territory Certificate of Education (NTCET) through subjects like Maths, English, PLP, Christian Studies and Integrated Learning. In English, SCC analysed a song by the famous rapper 'Briggs' and studied a Disney Pixar film. In Maths, the students have covered various topics such as data, measurement, geometry, and mobile phones.



Students joined Pathways with Police Cadets, Agriculture, Aviation, Music, and Media outside the classroom. SCC has students with various skills ranging from skilled footballers to amazing artists, gamers and basketballers. Despite a slow start to the year with Covid restrictions, SCC has worked hard, made the most of their time at Yirara and continue to grow into fantastic young leaders.

## Industry Connections

This subject allows students to build their knowledge and skills in a particular industry and helps prepare students for future pathways. Industries Yirara offers are Cooking, Business, Automotive, Digital Art, Personal Training, Barista, Childcare, Media, and Carpentry. The seniors have stepped up and challenged themselves across various industries, and we look forward to seeing more industry-related learning in 2023!









## Cooking



Students have had the opportunity to cook this term in a commercial kitchen. Developing cooking skills can lead to various job opportunities in restaurants, cafes, roadhouses, stations, and even on boats or tourist resorts on an island!!! Students worked in teams and shared jobs. It is important to follow all directions. Otherwise, you will not get the right outcome.

The Middle School made pikelets with jam and whipped cream, Tuna Patties, and delicious Corn Fritters in Term three! They have also completed worksheets identifying foods and equipment. The Senior School have cooked Honey BBQ Chicken Wings, Fried Rice, Hamburgers, Garlic Bread, a breakfast of handmade Damper, poached eggs, bacon, then an Asian rice noodle meal called Chicken Pad Thai. And for something sweeter a healthy Carrot Cake, Coconut Fruit Balls and Date Loaf. The students have shown keen interest and a good understanding of different food styles. They have behaved safely in the kitchen. In each session, we worked together, followed recipes and measured ingredients accurately. This is especially important because all recipes are planned and tested. If your measurements are wrong, it may not cook properly or taste right! They were outstanding young chefs. The Senior students have also completed a workbook, reflecting on what they have made, the equipment used, any challenges and various connections to jobs in the future. 


Science is a subject where students question the unknown; develop a curiosity to discover why things are the way they are. As they say: Science is Progress.

This year in Science, students have learned through careful observation, experimenting using different objects, recording their findings, writing about experiments and making sense of their experiences inside and outside the classroom.

All year levels have been focusing on safety procedures. It is an important life skill in the work environment, as well as developing their skills in working together and acting safely through the use of the equipment and conducting experiments in the Science Laboratory environment.

In our first Semester, we focused on different forms of energy and the Earth's resources. Explored how to use environmental and renewable forms of energy to care for the environment. Students learned about environmentally sustainable materials, where things come from, and how they are made; they used this knowledge to explain why some choices can positively impact our environment and the world.



We explored simple food preservation techniques and looked into the scientific principles, combining both traditional and scientific methods, for example: how salt can keep meat fresh for longer in the bush.

Years 7 and 8 Students particularly enjoyed learning about and sharing their knowledge of the Traditional Dreaming Stories of the stars in the heavens in our Astronomy topic: 'Earth and the Universe.'

Students are encouraged to question the world around them and to make predictions and explain why they think something is going to happen using logical reasoning. The students had a lot of fun learning in a fun, practical problem-solving-based learning environment.

## Woodworking

It has been an exciting year for the fellas in woodwork. They started drawing up plans for a large cubby house with four walls, three windows and a door. It was a challenging task, that pushed their knowledge and experience as they practised and perfected different carpentry skills. This built their confidence and leadership skills and connected the project with the Industry Connections program.









### Music

2022 began with the re-introduction of the Yirara2u program. With students unable to attend school due to COVID restrictions, teachers once again created engaging lessons; they were streamed online via our Yirara2u Facebook and YouTube channels and broadcast on ICTV for our students on community.

Music lessons started with an in-depth look at guitar anatomy and basic chords. Students became familiar with all the guitar parts before learning how to tune, strum, and pick chords. This led to playing full-length songs with different time signatures and strum patterns. Later in the term, Yirara2u online music lessons focused on drums, including the reintroduction of the junk drum kit, which featured in the original episodes in 2020. Students interested in how to play the drums but did not have access to a proper drum kit were shown how they could build their own using discarded drum-like items such as bins, buckets and containers.

As students returned in term two, in-class music lessons were able to resume as normal. We focused on music through the twentieth century, looking at the history and characteristics of several genres, their evolution and their transformation into modern music.

Throughout the year, students have taken full advantage of the Ableton music software in our recording studio. Students compose, program and mix their own music; we have seen some brilliantly creative and expressive results.




























During the spike of COVID-19 cases in Alice Springs and the Territory, Yirara College made the tough decision to return to long-distance learning for their students in Term One. While something similar had been carried out in 2020 with pre-recorded learning content being aired and televised, this time the staff decided to improve their skills and try something completely new.

Yirara2u 2.0 created a live streaming platform for students and their families to engage in online longdistance learning in real time with the opportunity to communicate live with their teachers during school hours. Staff worked in year level teams to live stream Math, Integrated Learning, Music, Art, Design Technology, Christian Studies and many more learning areas to ensure that Yirara College students were able to stay in touch with their teachers and up to date with their schooling.

During this time, there were a small number of day students able to attend the College and engage in the live streaming opportunity to reach their peers back in community. The entire Yirara College family worked hard as every area of the school did its part to ensure the smooth running and facilitation of Yirara2u 2.0 throughout Term One 2022.

A team of ICT and live-streaming individuals worked hard behind the scenes to ensure that the content delivered could reach the students in community and continue to air on ICTV, Facebook and YouTube.

## **Visual Arts**

This year has been another interesting year at Yirara, with lots of learning and fun in the Art room. One of the highlights of Term three has been the introduction of Digital Art using a program called Procreate on our iPads. Students loved experimenting with the plethora of brushes, tools and special effects.


Digital Art has been a real success with all year levels. In Year 9, the ladies loved creating a simple sunset landscape using airbrushing and blending tools. Some of the fellas in Year 9 had a go at drawing cars and translating their artworks into digital form.

Senior students picked things up quickly and advanced to using the layers tool. They created a range of stilllife watercolour paintings, cityscapes and their own landscape designs using layers, allowing us to work on individual layers simultaneously.

Away from Digital Art, many practical things were happening in the Art room with paints, clay and fine liner pens. Due to COVID-19 in Term one, our class sizes were small, allowing us to work on fun projects like painting a new sign for the Yirara Brumbies and improving our painting skills. We concentrated on improving the painting detail in our landscapes.

In Term two, the Year 7/8's experimented with various materials – chalk pastels, watercolour paints and fine liner pens. Some of the themes we explored were desert landscapes, cityscapes and producing a portrait with sunglasses. All students did a fantastic job, and seeing great work from all year levels was exciting.
























## Duke of Edinburgh

Participants in the Rural Operation and Agriculture cource have learnt how to grow different vegetables from seeds and seedlings, built a shade house to plant them in and what is needed to keep the plants healthy and pest free. After lunch we had two guest speakers from CfAT Ltd (Centre for Appropriate Technology). They were two Arrernte men: Mr Peter Renehan (Chief Executive Officer) and Mr Frank Curtis (Chairman). This place is across the road from us in the Desert Knowledge Centre. It was great to hear that NASA in the USA are talking to CfAT and planning how to use traditional owners in launching rockets into space and other new plans. Both men said that they weren't the best at school, but they worked hard and were supported to learn and to lead. They are proof that for all of us – if we aim for the stars, we walk on the moon.



## **Reconciliation Day**

In the week before Reconciliation Week (27 May – 3 June) we held our own Reconciliation Day at Yirara College. Often it is not an easy process this reconciliation, trying to bring people together to walk and live together, but it is important for every person to work on it.

### **Colour Smash**



### The Hub

Mr Adam and Miss Tina run "The Hub", designed to be a safe space for students who require additional support to transition back into the school routines and environment. The Hub is set up in a classroom environment where a small group of students work together to develop confidence in their abilities for learning.

### **Student Engagement Officers**

Mr Dwayne and Mr Mark are responsible for helping our students get to class on time and assisting with any issues that may arise. Mark and Dwayne are very passionate about our students engaging in their learning to ensure they have great opportunities when they leave Yirara.

#### Student Support Rewards Day

Each term Student Support acknowledges the students for all their hard work in staying in class and being so far away from family. This year we had an Easter Egg Hunt, a trip to the town pool, and played a Staff Vs Student football match (where our students proved to be much faster than our staff). At each Rewards day, we present Student Awards for our Senior and Junior Students who have shown excellent leadership and dedication to their learning throughout the term.

We appreciate how hard it is for our students and their families to be so far away from each other during the school term and strive to make our department a "home away from home" for our students to access support.



We want to thank the staff that have departed for their contribution to the brotherhood that is Male Boarding and give a warm welcome to the new staff members who have taken up the challenge.


