It's been another rich term of learning on Arrernte Country. Students explored storytelling through sand, paint, and written language.

We have used native fuchsia from Yirara-atula to make soap and investigate its cleaning properties in a science experiment while engaging in conversations about identity and what shapes who we are.

### **Christian Studies**



In Middle School, we explored the idea of the Bible as the History Book of the Universe and why it matters today, learning that it contains 66 books written by more than 40 authors over 1,500 years.

Senior School focused on the theme of Belonging and how it shapes our identity, including visits to local churches to compare their similarities and differences.



### Year 9 Maths

In Term 4, 2025, Year 9 students explored a range of concepts including perimeter, circumference, radius, and the area of rectangles, squares, and triangles using non-standard units.

They also applied the four arithmetic operations (x, +, -, ÷) and were introduced to terms such as the associative and commutative properties.

Students additionally used the online program Reflex to strengthen their fluency in addition and multiplication.



### Duke of Ed

For several years we've run the Duke of Edinburgh Award, a youth development program that helps students take responsibility for their goals, build community involvement, develop resilience, gain life skills, and broaden future opportunities.

The Award has three levels, Bronze, Silver and Gold each focusing on Skills, Physical Recreation, Service and an Adventurous Journey.

Over the past year, students joined a range of activities, from automotive maintenance and band sessions to improving footy skills, and volunteered at assemblies, chapel services and with Clontarf.


